Express service in Italy

1890-2001 and its precursors from XV century

In the past "Espresso" meant a person responsible for delivering correspondence faster than the regular postal service. Before the official birth of the "Express Courier" the sender indicated the requirement for speedy delivery on the letter with phrases like "Cito Cito", "Volando", "Per staffetta", "Subito", "Celeriter". With "Condannata" letters the sender committed the addressee to paying an additional fee if the letter arrived by the deadline indicated on the title page. The service had been popular in the Italian area since the pre-unification states: it was used in Lombardy-Venetia, which was the first to regulate the service, and in the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, even if a "Staffette" service was instituted at the end of the 1700s and early 1800s, initially for the Court and later also for private mail. The regular express service was introduced by Italian Royal Mail on July 21st, 1890, five years after the UPU Congress of Lisbon in 1885 which defined the principles. It ended on December 31st, 2001 and was replaced by other services for the express delivery of correspondence. In the first decades of life the service was meticulously regulated by a set of rules and written and disseminated by the Postal Bulletin with modifications dictated by the desire to improve the service and make it more efficient. The initial requirements included "Espresso" on the letter, a registered number, labels, special stamps and a special postmark. The first of the 48 "Mod. 24" labels was issued in 1893; in all, there were 31 bilingual labels, 8 in French, 8 in Italian and one in three languages. On June 1st, 1903 the first special ordinary stamp to the value of 25 c. was issued for inland postage while on September 1st, 1908 the first ordinary special stamp of 30 c. was issued for postage abroad; some other commemorative express stamps were issued. 13 special stamps were issued for inland service and 8 for abroad. No distinction was made between the values to be used for service inland and abroad from the 5 l. stamp issued on August 16th, 1945. The inland rates changed 29 times, from 25 c. to 3,600 l., and rates for abroad changed 30 times, from 30 c. to 3,600 l. This collection is the synthesis of an express service starting from letters of the XVth century with phrases indicating the requirement for quick delivery and continuing up to the 2001, year of the end of service.


Plan of the collection






Aug. 30th, 1498 Letter from Ferrara to Milano, addressed to the **Duke of Milan Ludovico**Maria Sforza called "Il Moro" with inscription *Cito-Cito* which means urgency, plus *Citissime* and reinforced with very rare use of the word *Celeriter* (iv)




Oct. 20th, 1459 letter from Bernareggio to Cremona, addressed to the **Duke of Milan**, **Francesco Sforza** with the Latin inscription *Portant Cito-Cito p. Caballantes Ducales* to state the urgency and the employ of a ducal estaffette (iv)


The Latin word *cito* means: soon, quickly, immediately. Its repetition reinforces the sense of urgency.



May 18th, 1472 letter to Milano addressed to the Ducal Secretary Chicco Simonetta, with inscription *Cito* repeated twice (iv)



The word *volando* means flying and brings a very good idea of the highest speed one could imagine for a rider at that time: the flight of a bird.




Jul. 7th, 1544 wrapper from a bundle of letters from Milano to Asti with inscription *Volando* repeated twice to reinforce the sense of urgency and "parte la stapheta de Milan adi siete de julio y a horas diez y siete" (iv)

Oct. 4th, 1593 letter sent by means of mounted courier from Ferrara by someone Paris Ferrari to Gio. Batta. Ladeschi the Secretary and Councilor of State of S. A. Serenissima with inscription for mounted courier *Volando* written into a triangle and the additional inscription "Leave October 4th at 03.00 p.m.". The presence of one triangle means that it was paid one extra fee for fast delivering (iv)




These symbols entered in use to show to the mounted courier or servant designated for mail dispatching his own inflicting penalty in case of delay, an admonishment to quicken one's step.



Dec. 2nd, 1545 wrapped from a bundle of letters signed up by **Symon de Tassis** from Alessandria to Milano, via Pavia, Tortona, Alessandria, with symbols for dispatch riders, four stirrups and rope and gallows: this the handwritten admonishment: "Imperial mounted couriers, the present letters must be dispatched diligently, riding day and night. Be careful, because everyone will pay his debit as showed below (Gallows symbol) in case of improper behavior or dispatching delay" (iv)

This symbols repeated several times, entered in use to state the number of estaffettes required to dispatch one mail. It should not be confused with one only triangle which is the symbol for one extra fee for fast delivery.



The inscription *Cito* repeated several times, during this century, entered in use as reinforcement coupled with its superlative *Citissime* to state the highest urgency and speed possible.








Aug. 7th, 1600 letter from Venezia to Padua with inscription *Subitto* repeated three times (iii)



Over XVIII° and XIX° century, espresso was not yet one additional postal service, it was the mere indication of one expressed or defined person for urgent mail dispatching. Under the enlightened rule of Maria Theresa of Austria and her son Joseph II, in South Tyrol among 1700 and 1800 a branch of the Thurn und Taxis was delivering mail from Bolzano to Trento, and by Fedrigotti of Ochsenfeld from Rovereto to Roverbella. The service was provided using bandwagons, that were so-called "MALLEPOSTE", it was also possible having an additional "Express Service" carryout by "Express Courier". The below mail, may have been delivered using one of such "Express Courriers" or "Per Staffetta Espresso"





A "Staffetta" service was provisionally introduced by an official notice of 8 May 1840 between Naples and Villa S. Giovanni on the mainland, extended to Messina – Palermo. There were five services a week from Palermo to Messina linking up with this "Staffetta"; three were by the mountain road with the Messina mail-coach, and two by sea. Letters sent by this service paid twice the normal rate on departure. It was a real "Express Service" organized in the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, a real example of precursor; in the Italian territory, of what was to setting up only after twenty years in the Kingdom of Lombardy-Venetia.



May 8th, 1840 letter from Messina to Lyon via Naples, the back of the letter shows a tax of 40 Grana, paid by the sender, of which 15 Grana fot the P.A. Naples. The letter reached Naples on 10 May 1840. The addressee in Lyon had to pay 12 cents for the Naples-Rome-Lyon stage

One of the three known "Staffetta Giornaliera" from Messina (ii) Early in the century in Kingdom of Lombardo - Veneto the urgency was usually empathized recommending the letter to the kindness of the dispatcher. Sometimes the reward to the dispatcher was conditioned (Condannata) by the delivery to the addressee within a fixed day and hour. This deferred payment and shipment modality through an expressed person represent the real special delivering service.



A special delivering service was introduced in Italian territory only at the end of 1859 in the Kingdom of Lombardy-Venetia then occupied by Austro- Hungarian Empire; the service was officially introduced the 1st October 1859. The new service, foresaw that the letters just arrived at the station of mail were delivered to the addressee by means of special currier. These letters were marked "to be transported by express" and needed to be registered, as the alone express service was not provided itself; it was always exclusively in addition at registration mail. For delivery these letters were due 15 S. Austrian for delivery during the day and 30 S. for the night. The only additional fee of Express Service could be charged to the addressee. The service was discontinued at end of 1866 when Veneto region was annex to Italy.





"Espresso - Urgente"

This service was launched with the intention as to further expedite Express Service. It was started May 1st, 1913 but as a result of its high cost, it was little used by the large public and soon was discontinued just over a year after, on 31st December 1914. 


