German East Africa, the largest of the former German Protectorates, extended with an area of roughly one million sq. km. making it almost twice as big as Germany proper at the time. In 1913 the population was estimated to be about 7,5 million including about 15.000 Arabs, East Indians and other non whites. The white population grew from 1131 in year 1900 to 5336 in 1913, including 4107 Germans.

At first Germans living in the East African area of the future German possession were forced to use occasionally available transport to have their mail carried to Zanzibar. There it could be turned to the British post office and later also to French or German postal agencies. From Zanzibar mail was carried to Europe by British or French ships. German presence in the territory is testify by letters of German explorers or traders forwarded by British or French Postal Agencies

The German Empire took over sovereignty of the GEA on 1 January 1891, A German Post Office was opened in Lamu on 22 November 1888 for the mail from the Witu Trading Station Denhart Co. On 1 April 1891 Dar Es Salaam became the Main Post Agency of the Protectorate. Up to 1894 seven new Postal Agencies were opened in coastal towns which were in part connected by messenger service. German stamps were available and German postal rates were used. First two frames of this collection exhibit that period (Forerunners)

In 1885. Denhart Brothers organised a German
Trading Station in the Lamu area just on the mouth of
Tana river in the Sultanate of Witu. Until November
1888 no post office was established in Lamu. The
Denhardt Co. mail was forwarded via Aden, Bombay
or Zanzibar. Letters addressed to Europe were carried
until Aden or Bombay by local ships and thed to
Brindisi by Oriental and Peninsular mailboats

November 1887. Letter from Denhardt Co. in Lamu addressed to Aden and redirected to Germany. This double weight letter was carried to Aden without franking and there Indian stamps were added and cancelled on 14 November 14 as rates. On the arrival the addressee had to pay a postage due for the weight. On the reverse we note a "Sea Post Office" c.d.s. dated 11 November, the circular c.d.s. of Aden dated 13 November and the arrival postmark of Schleusingen dated 26 November.



Arrival pmk dated 7 April. Manuscript registration label in use from February 1891.

FORERUNNERS German Presence in East Africa Lemes addressed to the famous explorer Emin Pasha (Carl Schnitzer)



Edward Theodor Schnitzer born in Silesia in 1940 was a phisician. naturalist and African explorer. Amin Pasha was a title conferred on him in 1886. He was Governor of Equatoria but after Mahadi revolt he was prisoner and then convinced to leave for the Coast. In 1891, he entered the service of GEA and accompanied Dr Stuhlmann on an Expedition to the Lakes in interior but he was killed by two slave traders.



11 April 1891. Double weight registered letter addressed to Amin Pasha (Eduard Theodor Schnitzer). The letter was send when the addressee accompanied the Shtulmann Expedition to the Great Lakes and was killed. Therefore the letter was send back to the sender. On reverse we note postmarks of Bagamoyo (9 May 1891), Dar es Salaam (12 March 1892) and Berlin (5,6,7 April 1892).

Bagamoyo in April 1890. He was accompanied by two officiers: a medical officier Stuhlmann and Lieutenant Wilhelm Langheld who was in charge of the military escort. Langheld was detached in the arab settlement of Kondoa Irangi where the German flag was raised and then in June was in Tabora where the German flag was also raised. On September Emin Pasha reached the White Fathers Mission on Lake Victoria and in October crossed the lake by canoe and reached Bukoba. He was not joined by Langheld until January 1891 and it may be that this letter was written just in Bukoba.


A German Post office was opened in Lamu from 22 November 1888 until 31 March 1891. The only used postmark is reproduced below and German stamps were available. Letters were carried by local ships to Aden or Zanzibar and then to Europe. Postal rates: letters less than 15 gr., 20 pfennigs; registration fee 20 pfennigs.

A German Postal Agency in Zanzibar was opened on 27 September 1890 and closed on 31 July 1891. The cancellation is shown below, G.E.A. postal rates were introduced and German stamps were available. As usual, mail addressed to Europe was carried to Marseilles by French Ships of the Indian Ocean Line or to Naples and Hamburg by the "Ostafrika Line" mailboats.







Postal Routes. In German East Africa coast mail addressed to Europa was carried by ships and three routes exist. These were: the two branch of DOAL coastal service starting on July 1890. One (southern) running fortnightly from Mikindani to Lindi, Kilva and Zanzibar. The other (northern) run fortnightly too from Tanga.Saadani, Bagamoyo, Dar Es Salaam and Zanzibar. Besides these are to consider the small local boats which run twice a week between the coast and Zanzibar where all mail addressed to Europe were taken as usually by German.








SMS Leipzig in Zanzibar

The German East Africa Line (DOAL) postal service started in 1890 and was soon followed by a contract between the German Government and the Company called for a ship every four weeks. Each ship had its own postal clerk and canceller. The Hamburg – East Africa service timings were as follows: Hamburg – Lisbon 8 – 9 days, Lisbon – Naples 6 days, Naples – Port Said 5 days, Port Said – Aden 6 days, Aden – Tanga – Zanzibar – Dar-es-salaam 7 – 8 days. Ships called at Zanzibar to drop mail, en route for Dar – Es – Salaam, returned to Zanzibar and then went south to Mozambique. Mail and passengers service was made in various harbours.











During the first world war German East Africa was cut off from Germany and many measures had to be arranged. Stock of postage stamps were being depleted without any real prospect of new supplies. Therefore in May 1915 a system of cash franking was introduced in Dar es Salaam for printed matter (normally franked 2.% heller) and simple letter (franked 7% heller). Similar arrangement were control of Tanga, Tabora, Lindi, Makalama, Mkumbara, Morogoro, Kigoma, Korogwe and Wilhelmsthal. Various boxed and unboxed marks were used. Each marking had to be signed with initials of two postal employees. We see for double weight letters and registration fee an addition of residue supplementary stamps.



CENTRAL RAILROAD


Work on this rail line, was started on February 9, 1905, and reached Morogoro on December 16, 1907. Train service was extended to Kilossa on January 1, 1910, to Dodoma on November 1910 and to Tabora on July, 1912. The rail construction reached Kigoma on February 1, 1914 with terminus on Lake Tanganika. This railroad, extended for 1245 km was called Mittelandbahn.

On the postmark we note the trainnumber and indenting letters from "a" to "c" identifying which conductor used the cancellation. The rail service was terminated in August 1916 for war reason





The Usambara Railroad reached Mombo in 1904. Therefore, from 1905 through 1907 mail was accepted from time to time by the native station officials of the Usambara Railroad postal service. With the establishment of the Conductors Mail Service, specific Rail post cancellation devices were placed in use with the identifying letters a and b as well as numerals 1 through 6 for the train numbers.

The currency was revised in 1904 with the introduction of the East African Rupee at 100 Heller, 3 Rupees being equivalent to 4 Mark


