CORRESPONDENCE STATIONERY IN THE FREE TERRITORY OF TRIESTE

At the conclusion of the Paris Conference, between Italy and the allied forces, the Free Territory was established on February 10. 1947, by a protocol of the Peace to accommodate an ethnically and culturally mixed population in a neutral independent country. It came into existence on 15 September 1947.

Its administration was divided into two areas: Trieste and a strip of its territory to the north occupied by the western forces became Zone A, with a territory of about 222,5km² and comprised about 310,000 inhabitants, of which 240,000 Italians, 63,000 Slovenians; the portion of the territory south of Trieste occupied by the Yugoslav army (Koper, Parenzo, Buje and Novigrad) became Zone B with a territory of 515,5km² with 68,000 inhabitants, of which 51,000 were Italians, 8,000 Slovenians and 9,000 Croats.

The development of a definitive conflict between the Western and the Soviet worlds, with the start of what will be called the "cold war", postponed the constitution of the new state "indefinitely" and the two areas of the Free Territory of Trieste remained separate and subject to their respective occupation governments.

After a long negotiation between the U.S.A., Great Britain, Italy and Yugoslavia (which in the meantime had left the Soviet bloc), the "London memorandum" was stipulated on 5 October 1954, according to which Zone A of the Free Territory of Trieste returned to the Italian civil administration and zone B passed to the Yugoslav civil administration. In 1975 the Osimo Agreements were stipulated with which Italy and Yugoslavia mutually recognized sovereignty over the two areas.



In application of the London memorandum, the Italian Armed Forces entered Trieste on October 26, 1954, the day set for the transfer of power from the A.M.G. to the Italian Government.

The transition from the Allied Military Government of Venezia Giulia to the new "Allied Military Government Free Territory of Trieste" did not cause changes in the organization of the postal services in Trieste, where Francesco Greco continued in the position of director.

For 15 days the stamps and postcards overprinted "AMG-VG" continued to be sold and used and then invalidated on 1.10.1947, the day on which started the distribution of the new stamps of the Free Territory overprinted "AMG-FTT". There was a tolerance of two days, period in which mixed postage was possible (rare if non philatelic).

The postal rates allowed were those of Italy. In the seven years and 41 days of life of the Free Territory of Trieste - zone A, the tariff periods were: five for the interior of the zone and for Italy with progressive increases in tariffs from 10 to 25 lira for the letter, from 8 to 20 lira for the post card, from 20 to 55 lira for the recommendation fee, from 25 to 50 lira for the express surcharge and from 6 to 10 lira for air mail; four for abroad with progressive increases from 30 to 60 lira for the letter, from 20 to 35 lira for the post card, from 40 to 65 lira for the recommendation fee, from 60 to 85 lira for the express surcharge and for the air-mail rates these were originally 25 lira and subsequently removed for Europe, while intercontinental varied according to destination.

After the return of Trieste to Italy, AMG-FTT postal items remained in use for 20 days: on November 13, 1954, the use of Italian postal values was restored and the prior overprinted items were allowed a further 2 days during which period mixed postage was possible: non-philatelic uses are very interesting and rare.

EXHIBIT PLAN

In this collection we are exhibiting all 33 postal cards issued and used during the period (including an essay and a private printing), listed in order of issue date. They are grouped into three categories:

- a) the provisional overprinted issues (9 issues, 30 frames)
- b) the 15mm Rome overprinted issues (11 issues, 23 frames)
- c) the 10mm Rome overprinted issues (13 issues, 28 frames)



1.Trieste Provisional Overprints


While all the adhesive stamps were typographically overprinted at the Tipografia Fortuna in Trieste, the postal stationery were manually overprinted by the Postal Authorities. All postal stationery items used during this period were those of the Democratica series issued in Rome. They were provided over time to satisfy the various postal rates in use.

This was done initially with the linear 24mm AMG-FTT (commonly known as the type A) on the stamp imprint. Subsequently it was decided that also the text "Repubblica Italiana" should be overprinted and so, in October 1947, also the boxed Italian T.L.T. (Territorio Libero di Trieste), commonly known as the Type C, was introduced. And finally, December of the same year a boxed English A.M.G. F.T.T. (Allied Military Government - Free Territory of Trieste), commonly known as Type B, was supposed to be used particularly for foreign mail. Occasionally, we will also come across the use of the 2 line TERRITORIO LIBERO TRIESTE, normally used on International Reply Coupons and on Money Orders.

Theoretically one set of overprints were to be used on any one item: that is Type A on the stamp imprint and Type B or C on the text. But instructions were not clear and in cases human nature also played its part. in cases human nature also played its part. In fact, probably due to hast in most cases, or negligence, or simply want of favors or speculation, we will find cases of single overprints, or double and sometimes triple strikes, or the three types used together, or misplaced strikes.

In the case of postal reply cards, the reply cards sometimes missed being overprinted (which may also be one of the reasons why we will find very few reply cards sent back to the area) or were overprinted differently from the message cards. More often postal message and reply cards were separated and used individually.







2. The 15mm Rome Overprints

By the end of October 1949 the Italian Government Printing Bureau in Rome began to prepare the adhesives to be used in Trieste. Several factors contributed to this, the first of which was the delay in reaching an agreement for the area. But there were also other determining factors, such as the availability of specialised equipment and personnel, cost savings and, most of all, security.

The procedure was extended also the postal stationery, whereby these items were delivered to the Trieste Headquarters already overprinted. In this period the correspondence stationery was again that of the Democratica series and will end with the "Quadriga" definitive.

The first overprints were characterised by an 18mm linear overprint on the stamp imprint and an 85mm linear overprint on the text. Subsequently only a 15mm overprint on the stamp will be used.

From time to time items struct with both the machine on the stamp and manual overprint on the text will be found: these were due to some perhaps too diligent employee wanting to make sure the card text was overprinted, or for the usual philatelic reason of creating a rare item.

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3. The 10mm Rome Overprints

During the previous period when the 15mm overprint was being used, with the first commemorative issue for the 30th International Milan Fair, on April 18th, 1952, the new 10mm linear AMG-FTT typographical overprint was experimented by the Government Printing Bureau. It would again be used on the 60 Lira Aerogramme issued in May. But it will be only from September of the same year that the new overprint will be used exclusively on all subsequent issues.

For sure the new overprint was less invasive compared to the previous. The first experiment was done on a stamp imprint larger than normal definitive, while in the second case the stamp imprint was smaller.

The Quadriga set of 4 postal cards with the previous 15mm overprint was completed by a letter card and a domestic postal card, which together with the 120 Lira aerogramme, were the last definitive correspondence stationery items to be overprinted. In this case with the 10mm. After these only commemorative cards will be overprinted, always with the 10mm linear.


Further to be noted, with the exception of the first two postal cards and the letter card, all stationery was issued contemporaneously in Trieste and in Italy, meaning that the Government Printing Bureau received instructions to automatically supply Trieste with the new issues.



Manually overprinted 4 Lira purple Democratica Card

Prepared in September 1947 the manually overprinted 4 Lira purple Democratica postal card was made available for sale on October 1st together with the first stamps for the Free Territory of Trieste. A total of 118,000 postal card were processed manually with the linear "AMG-FTT" (Type A) struct only on the stamp imprint. These were the 4 Lira Democratica cards issued in Italy in June of the same year.

The 4 Lira card satisfied only the rate for correspondence with military and between mayors, and therefore it is practically always found with additional postage applied.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in purple on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.


The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a torch was designed by Paolo Paschetto

8 Lira Domestic Card rate (31/7/1947 -10/8/1948)

The card with type A overprint was sent from Trieste on 17/10/1947 to Milan, additionally franked for the 8 Lira the domestic card rate.

25 Lira Domestic Express Rate

The card with type A overprint was sent from Trieste to Genova on 11/11/1947, additionally franked for a total of 33 Lira, being 8 Lira the domestic card rate and 25 Lira the express service


20 Lira Intl. Card rate (1/9/1947 -10/8/1948)

The card with type A overprint was sent from Trieste on 4/12/1947 to Abbazia (now Opatija, in Yugoslavia).

Erroneously franked for 4 Lira only considering it was still in Zone B as in the previous AMG-

The card with type A overprint was sent from Trieste on 8/11/1947 to Linz (Austria). Additionally franked for a total of 76 Lira to complete the rates.



Manually Overprinted 8 + 8 Lira purple Democratica Postal Reply Card

On January 10th 1948 the manually overprinted 8 + 8 Lira purple Democratica postal reply cards were made available for sale. The cards were originally issued in Italy the previous November, and corresponded to the then internal card rate.

A total of 6,000 cards were processed with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with either the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) or "T.L.T." (type C) on the text of the message and reply cards. Various and different combinations are known.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in purple on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm. The cards were sold folded with perforation rouletting 8.

The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a heavy hammer breaking a chain was designed by Alfredo Lalia.



Manually Overprinted 8 + 8 Lira purple Democratica Postal Reply Card

8 Lira Domestic card rate (15/9/1947 -10/8/1948)

The reply half of the 8+8 Lira card with the linear Type A overprint, returned from Portogruaro (VE) on 6/7/1948 to Trieste.





15 Lira Domestic card rate (10/4/1949 -31/7/1951)

25 Lira Express Service rate

The reply half of the 8+8 Lira card with the linear Type A overprint, sent from Trieste as a single card, on 3/11/1949 to Rome.

The card was additionally franked for 7 Lira to satisfy the postal card rate, and 40 Lira for the express service.



Manually Overprinted 8 + 8 Lira purple Democratica Postal Reply Card

20 Lira International card rate (15/9/1947 -10/8/1948)

The reply half of the 8+8 Lira card with the linear Type A overprint, sent from Trieste as a single card, on 10/6/1948 to Paris (France).

The card was additionally franked for 12 Lira to satisfy the postal card rate.





10 Lira International Printed Matter Rate (1/1/1950 — 31/8/1951)

The message half of the 8+8 Lira card with the linear Type A and boxed Type B overprints, sent from Trieste to Tel Aviv (israel) on 21/4/1951.

The card was additionally franked for 2 lira in order to comply with the international printed matter rate.



On January 15th 1948 the manually overprinted 8 Lira purple Democratica postal cards were made available for sale. The cards were originally issued in Italy the previous november, and corrisponded to the then internal card rate.

A total of 42,000 cards were processed with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with either the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) or "T.L.T." (type C) on the card text. But various combinations are known.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in purple on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.

The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a heavy hammer breaking a chain was designed by Alfredo Lalia.



8 Lira Domestic Card rate (15/9/1947 -10/8/1948)

10 Lira Open Registered Items rate (15/9/1947-10/8/1948)

The card with overprint type A and B was sent from Trieste on 3/4/1948 locally.

The card was additionally franked for 10 lira to cover the rates.





15 Lira Domestic Card rate (10/4/1949 -31/7/1951)

The card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 22/4/1950 to Macerata..

The card was additionally franked for 7 lira to complete the rate.



20 Lira Intl Card rate (15/9/1947 -10/8/1948)

60 Lira Intl Express Service rate (15/9/1947 -10/8/1948)

The card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 1/7/1948 to Zurich (Switzerland).

The card was additionally franked for the 72 Lira to cover the rates.

Card struck with arrival cancel.





25 Lira Intl Card rate (11/8/1948 -31/12/1949)

The card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 23/12/1948 to Rumford (USA).

The card was additionally franked for the 17 lira to cover the rate..



Typographically Overprinted 8 Lira purple Democratica Postal Card 1948 Trieste Philatelic Congress

On the occasion of the 1948 Philatelic Congress in Trieste, similarly to the set of adhesives, 2,000 of the 8 Lira purple Democratica postal cards were typographically overprinted in red ink with an embossed "A.M.G.F.T.T. 1948 TRIESTE" and the postal horn on the stamp imprint. The overprinting was done by the Stabilimento Modiano in Trieste.

The cards were put on sale on September 8th 1948. At that time the Domestic card rate had already been increased to 12 Lira and therefore the cards were always used with additional franking.

The card was taxed.

The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a heavy hammer breaking a chain was designed by Alfredo Lalia.

12 Lira Domestic Card Rate

(11/8/1948 - 9/4/1949)

The 8 Lira card with the commemorative overprint was sent from Trieste on 13/9/1948 to Lucca, with additional franking for the 4 Lira





25 Lira Intl card rate

60 Lira International Registered Service Rate (11/8/1948 -10/1/1950)

The 8 Lira card with commemorative overprint was sent registered from Trieste on 6/11/1948 to Berlin (Germany).

The 85 Lira required is paid with additional adhesives, some of which were from the same commemorative issue.

On the reverse the card was struck with the train cancels in transit, while the arrival cancel was applied on the front.



On October 4th 1948 the manually overprinted 20 Lira+20 Lira red Democratica postal reply cards for foreign destinations were made available for sale. The cards were originally issued in Italy the previous December.

A total of 3,000 cards were overprinted with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with either the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) or "T.L.T." (type C) on the text of the message and reply cards. Various combinations are known.

When issued the cards did not correspond to any postal rate. In fact the Domestic card rate was 12 Lira, while the international card rate had been increased to 25 Lira.

Eventually, when the Domestic card rate was increased to 20 Lira, the message and reply cards were sold and used separated.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in red on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.

The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a torch was designed by Paolo Paschetto



20 Lira Domestic Card rate (1/8/1951 - 15/11/1954)

The message card with overprint type A only was sent from Bassovizza on 1/9/1952 to Cormons (GO).





20 Lira Domestic Card rate (1/8/1951 - 15/11/1954)

35 Lira Open Registered Items rate(1/8/1951 -15/11/1954)

The message card with type A overprint only was sent from Trieste on 1/8/1952 locally.

35 Lira in stamps were added to complete the rates.



25 Lira Intl Card rate (11/8/1948 -31/12/1949)

The message card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 27/10/1949 to Chula Vista (USA).

The card with attached the reply card was additionally franked for the 5 Lira to cover the rate.





35 Lira Intl Card rate (1/1/1950 -15/11/1954)

The message card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 2/3/1950 to Berlin (Germany).

The card, with reply card attached, was additionally franked for the 15 lira to cover the rate.

The card was struck with arrival cancel.



On October 14th 1948 the manually overprinted 20 Lira red Democratica International postal cards were made available for sale. The cards were originally issued in Italy the previous December.

A total of 6,000 cards were processed with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with either the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) or "T.L.T." (type C) on the card text. Various combinations are known.


When issued the cards did not correspond to any postal rate: the domestic rate for postal cards was 12 Lira, while the international card rate had been increased to 25 Lira.




The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in red on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.

The card with type A only overprint was sent from Trieste on 17/7/1952 to Walsall (United Kingdom).

The card was additionallt franked for the 15 lira to the rate.



On December 21st 1948 the manually overprinted 12 Lira green Democratica postal cards were made available for sale. The cards were originally issued in Italy on the previous October 30th.

A total of 240,000 cards were processed with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with either the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) or "T.L.T." (type C) on the card text. Various combinations are known.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in green on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.


The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing the planting of an olive tree was designed by Mario Melis and Antonio Mazzotta.

The card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 9/2/1949 to New York (USA).

The card was additionally franked for the 68 Lira to cover the rates.

The card with type A and C overprints was sent from Trieste on 26/7/1950 to Obervellach (Austria).

The card was erroneously franked for a total of 55 lira, the international letter rate from 1/1/1950 to 31/8/1951.



On July 20th 1949 the manually overprinted 15 Lira green Democratica postal cards were made available for sale. The cards were originally issued in Italy on 2/7/1949.

A total of 120,000 cards were processed with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with either the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) or "T.L.T." (type C) on the card text. Various combinations are known.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in green on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.

The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a torch was designed by Paolo Paschetto



The card with type A and C overprints was sent from Trieste on 26/9/1949 to Vienna (Austria).

The card was additionally franked for the 10 Lira to cover the rate.

The card was censored on arrival.





25 Lira Intl Card rate (11/8/1948 -31/12/1949)

The card with type A and B overprints was sent from Trieste on 13/10/1949 to Chula Vista (USA).

The card was not additionally franked to cover the rate, and was taxed on arrival in the USA.



Manually Overprinted 15 + 15 Lira Democratica Postal Reply Card Essay

In the same period as the single cards, also a limited quantity of the 15 + 15 Lira Democratica Postal Reply cards were overprinted. The cards were originally issued in Italy on 2/7/1949. The cards were processed with the linear "AMG-FTT" (type A) on the stamp imprint and with the boxed two line "A.M.G. F.T.T." (type B) on the card text.

As there does not exist documentation on their issuance, and none have ever been found used, the cards are considered essays.

November 12th, 1949, the typographically overprinted 15 Lira green Democratica postal cards were received from Rome. The cards were originally issued in Italy on 2/7/1949. A total of 150,000 cards were issued, with an 18mm linear AMG-FTT overprint on the stamp and an 85mm "A.M.G. - F.T.T." large linear on the text.



The card was printed using the rotogravure technique in green on a buff paper. It measured 148x105mm while the stamp imprint 19x23mm.

The card belonged to the Italian Democratica Serie, and the stamp imprint representing a torch was designed by Paolo Paschetto





40 Lire Express rate (11/8/1948– 31/8/1951)

The card was sent from Trieste on 25/5/1950 to Linz (Austria).

The card was additionally franked to cover the rates.

The card was struck with transit and arrival cancels.



Typographically Overprinted 15 + 15 Lira green Democratica Postal Reply Card Overprint on Text and Stamp Imprint

March 30th, 1950, the typographically overprinted 15 Lira + 15 Lira green Democratica postal reply cards were delivered from Rome. They were issued originally in Italy on 2/7/1949.

A total of 14,000 were issued, and similarly to the single cards, they bare an 18mm linear AMG-FTT overprint on the stamp and an 85mm "A.M.G. - F.T.T." large linear on the text.
