The Great Army "Grande Armée" was created by French Emperor Napoleon on August 1905 for the war against Austria and Russia and then against Prussia, Russia and Poland (1806 - 1807). The Postal Service was structured with a General Post Office allocated to the Army Headquarters and each Army Corps Headquarters had his own P.O.; Inside the Corps each Division also disposed of a P.O. Sedentary Post Offices were also created in many occupied towns. Each Army P.O. had received three postmarks: one for postage due letters, where the addressee had to pay the amount of service, one for letters prepaid by sender and the Deboursé postmark for letters forwarded back to the sender or to another P.O. Postal marks were in black, red or various shades of blue-green.



Taxation of letters

The postal charge was independent of the length of the distance outside France. Soldiers letter sent from everywhere in Europe, were taxed as domestic mail only: from the French border until civil French post office of destination. The tax increased with the weight and distance: weight less as gr. 6 and distance less as km.500 = 6 decimes, weight between 6 and 8 gr., same distance = 8 decimes, between 8 and 10 gr. = 12 decimes, between 10 and 20 gr. = 30 decimes. Weight less as 6 gr. and distance between 800 and 1000 km. charge was 10 decimes. Same weight distance 500 to 600 km the charge was 7 decimes. Weight between 6 gr. and 8 gr. and distance between 600 to 800 km charge was 14 decimes; same weight for distance between 800 and 1000 km the charge was 11 decimes. Tax for letters sent inside the Army prepaid or postage due was 2 decimes with any distance and weight. Letters could be sent free of charge on the condition that the sender wrote his function on the Army and signed it on the front of the letter. The postal charge for letters addressed to any European locality were charged as below.

The tax amount was manuscript in front of the letter. Tax of prepaid letter was written on the back .





Grande Armée was renamed in 1805 from the Army that Napoleon had assembled on the French Coast of the English Channel for the proposed invasion of Britain. Then Napoleon replaced the Army east again Austria and Russia. Therefore the Armée des Cotes became Grande Armée.

Here exhibited we see a *Cantinière* letter from a Dragon soldier stationed in the Camp of St. Pierre near Brest dated "*le 20 Thermidor an 13*" (8 July 1805). Taxed on the address side 8 decimes and showings, full colours, a Navy of the Imperial Fleet.

Prepaid manuscript 8 decimes for a letter with weight between 6 and 8 gr, and distance less as 500 km. We note the framed rectangular pmk T4 referring to the town distribution post office. Interior signed by Martin Chasserouge employé à la 2me. Division, Premier Corps d'Armée.

12 Mars 1807. Letter from Frauenburg addressed to Montpellier with the very uncommon red three lines pmk. Premièr Corps / Grande Armée / Port Payée N 4. Tax 12 decim. manuscript on reverse.



1805 -1808 Second Army Corps

The 2.nd Army Corps P.O., coming from Holland proceeding to use his own postmark before and during the Austerlitz Campaign.

2 March 1805. Letter from Strasbourg addressed to Var Department. Red postmark B.au G.al - Grande Armèe. Taxed 8 decimes for a letter with weight between 6 and 8 gr and distance less as 500 km. The sender wrote his own address. "Armée du Rhin en Cantonnement à Strasbourg, Division du General Oudinot, 9.me (?) Battalion des Grenadier, 2.me Legère, 1.re Compagnie à Strasbourg.

29 August 1805. Prepaid letter from Ottingen addressed to the Medecin principal du 4me. Corps de la Grande Armèe au Quartier General in Passau. Red Postmark N 1 Port Payée / Grande Armée. On reverse taxed 2 decimes for letters sent inside the Army with any distance and weight.



Wien, 20 February 1806. Letter addressed to department *Des Lander*? Red. pmk. N 1 GRANDE ARMEE. Taxed 10 decimes for a letter sent to distance between 800 and 1000 km (weight less as 6 gr.). The sender was the Battalion Chief of the 3rd Army Corps.

30 June 1806. Letter from Elring addressed to Lille. Red handstamp N 2 Grande Armée allocated to the 2nd Division (Vandamme) of the Fourth Army Corps. The letter was taxed on arrival 7 decimes for a weight less as 6 gr and distance between 500 and 600 km.

16 January 1807. Letter from Presnitz, Ville de la Pologne addressed to Mayence. Very uncommon red handstamp N 2 Port Payé / Grande Armée. The addressee was a Proviseur de l'Armèe therefore the sender, a Captain of 28th Reg de Ligne, prepaid 2 decimes for a letter sent inside the Army.

18 October 1805. Text endorsed *Le 26 Vendemmiere an 14*. Letter writhing by General Vandamme, Chief of the 2nd. Division in Lautheim, addressed to Marshal Berthier, War Minister. Red postmark **N**4 / Grande Armée. Official letter free of charge.

16 September 1806. Letter from Altdorf addressed to Marseilles with red postmark N. 3 Grande Armée allocated to the Headquarter of the Fourth Army Corps. Taxed manuscript 12 decimes. The 8 on the upper left corner is probably referring to the weight.



14 May 1808. Prepaid letter addressed near Warsovie. Pmk.

N. 3 Port Payée / Grande Armée. The addressee is the Capitaine

29 August 1808. Letter from Hannover to Paris. We note the red pmk. **N. 4 Grande Armée.** Tax manuscript 8 decimes for a letter with weight between 6 and 8 gr. and distance less as 500 km. Arrival in Paris red pmk dated 7 September.

13 April 1806. Prepaid letter from Lettenweiss addressed to Montreuil. Red postmark N 5. Port Payé / Grande Armée. On reverse manuscript postal charge of 14 decimes.



Postmark N. 6 Grande Armée allocated to the General Post Office of the Fifth Army Corps, Taxes 8 decimes for a letter sent to distance less as 500 km and weight between 6 and 8 gr. We read: Le lendemain de ma lettre le Regiment fut attaqué par 2 à 3 mille Cosaques formant l'avangarde de l'Armée Russe qui s'avancait pour prendre position. Nous avons 150 hommes à cheval. Malgré notre nombre si disproportionné notre Regiment battait en retraite dans le plus grande ordre... Phew days after Austerlitz battle.

13 September 1807. Letter from Paris addressed to Captain Deval of the 6th. Company Horses Artillery and readressed to the 3rd. Cuirassier Division. We note the uncommon handstamp N 6 Deb / Grande Armée allocated to the field post office of the Fifth Army Corps and the very uncommon N 46 / Grande Armée allocated to the 2nd. Division of the 10th Army Corps. At time the 2 field post offices seem be located near Danzig and Berlin. The letter was taxed 8 decimes.



Black seal "Ministere de la Guerre". Free of charge. Probably this letter was sent by mistake to the Sixst ArmyCorps and then a Deboursé postmark was applied.




15 March 1807. Letter from Guttstadt addressed to Grenoble. Red - brown postmark N. 7 Déb / Grande Armée applied for mistake because the letter was sent postage due and the addressee had to pay 8 decimes for this letter with weight between 6 and 8 gr. and distance less as 500 km.

19 August 1808. Prepaid letter to Avignon with field postmark N. 9 Port Payée / Grande Armée allocated to the General Post Office of the First Army Corps. Prepaid 12 decimes (manuscript on reverse) for a distance less as 500 km and weight between 8 and 10 gr.



13 January 1808. Letter from Berlin addressed to General Seroux Commander of Artillery of the Sixth Army Corps. Postmark N. 9 / Grande Armée allocated to the General Post Office of the First Army Corps. On the lower left corner we see red two lines mark "Ier Inspecteur General de l'Artillerie". Letter sent free of charge because the red mark of the sender prove his function in the Army.

19 January 1806.. Letter from Saltzburg addressed to Anvers. Red Field postmark N. 9 grande Armée allocated to the Second Division (Leval). Taxed 6 decimes with weight less as 6 gr. and distance less as 500 km.



January 1807. Prepaid letter from Warshaw addressed to Bastia in the Corse Island Field red postmark **N. 9 Port Payée / Grande Armée** allocated to the Second Division. Taxed 12 decimes (manuscript on reverse).

16 September 1807. Letter from Sagan (Slesien) addressed to Paris. Field postmark N. 10 Grande Armée allocated to the First Division of Dragons commanded by G.al De la Tour Mauburg. Manuscript 8 decimes postal due for a letter with weight between 6 and 8 gr and distance less as 500 km. Arrival Paris red handstamp dated 7 October.





2nd. August 1897. Letter *Cantinière* from Lodi addressed to Versäilles with the portrait of the sender, a soldier of the 23rd, Regt. of Dragons. On reverse we see over the address manuscript 8 decimes.







In the content we read: "Cependant on nous assure que I'Impereur va nous visiter et si sa Majesté quitte Bayonne, l'Impératrice n'y restera surement pas. Nous sommes sur le point de faire un mouvement.....pour nous rapprocher de l'Infanterie......Nous serons dans une petite ville qui est pas très jolie mais qui vaut encore mieux q'un camp.

During the years 1809, 1810 and 1811 and the first months of 1812, before the reorganization of the French Army, several detachment were operative in the occupied towns of Europe. The Army postal service works as before. Field postmarks of the **Army d'Allemagne** were brought into use again

We note the arrival pmk. of Paris dated 27 January and the framed rectangular T3 allocated to the Paris distribution post office.
