

Mail from the Kingdom of Italy to foreign countries 1879 - 1902

Historical postal context

On 9 January 1878, day of death of his father King Vittorio Emanuele II, succeeded to the throne Umberto I. The King was considered the symbol of all the problems of the population and he just escaped death two times, in 1878 and 1897 during two unsuccessful attacks, but the third attack, the last, hit the target 29 July 1900 in Monza by the hands of anarchist Gaetano Bresci.

<u>Purpose</u>

The aim of the exhibit is to illustrate the rates from the Italian Kingdom to the foreign countries, from 1879, when the Universal Postal Union (UPU) was established, to 1902 the end of validity of the stamps issued during the kingdom of Umberto I.

Till to 1879 the rates for abroad were different for every country, so as the weight unities and the fees for all other postal services. From 1st April 1879 the Treathy of the Universal Postal Union, simplified the rates for abroad and unified the weight for each port of 15 grams, dividing in three zones, the letter rates were:

A zone: 25 centesimi for the European countries, Egypt, Persian, Canada, Newfoundland and U.S.A.

B zone: 40 centesimi for the other UPU Countries and non UPU Countries (to 29th February 1888).

C zone: 65 centesimi for the non UPU Countries (from 1st March 1888).

Different rates were defined also for A, B, C zone for the postcards, printed matter, specimen and manuscripts.

The C zone rates were repealed on 1st July 1892 and the "non UPU Countries" rate was made equal the B zone rates. The B zone rates were repealed on 1st January 1899, by the unification of all rates to the foreign.

The exhibit is organized by country and for a better presentation the countries are subdivided in three groups: European Countries, African and Asian Countries and American Countries.

Philatelic importance and rarity

Very important are the destinations for: San Marino Republic, Principality of Monaco, Luxembourg, Gibraltar, Crete, Morocco, Palestine, German South West Africa, French West Africa, Zanzibar, German East Africa, La Rèunion, British Burma, Siam, French Indochina, Penang, Sumatra, Manchuria, Macao, Japan, New Zealand, Fiji Islands, El Salvador, Puerto Rico, Suriname, Colombia, Bolivia.

The most important letter of the exhibit is franked with the stamps of 30 centesimi and 2 Lire, the only letter recorded with combined use of these two postage stamps (pag. 33).



Rates of letters addressed to Papal States (Vatican possessions within the city of Rome) were equal to the Italian domestic rates of 20 centesimi for each 15 grams.



29 April 1884. Registered five rate letter from Carovigno (Brindisi) to Rome, prepaid 1,30 Lire to destination. Rate 1,30 Lire: 1 Lira five letter rate (20 centesimi for each 15 grams) and 30 centesimi registration fee.



Rates of letters addressed to San Marino Republic were equal to the Italian domestic rates of 20 centesimi for each 15 grams.



29 September 1884. Registered triple rate letter from Rome to San Marino Republic, prepaid 85 centesimi to destination. Rate 85 centesimi : 60 centesimi triple rate letter (20 centesimi for each 15 grams) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



Principality of Monaco joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.




22 November 1894. Single rate letter from Genoa to Montecarlo (Monaco Principality), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



17 <u>December 1897.</u> Registered single rate letter from Castelletto to Monaco Principality, prepaid 50 cent. (to A zone). Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single rate letter and 25 centesimi registration fee.





26 April 1898. Private postcard from Florence to Montecarlo (Monaco Principality), prepaid 10 centesimi (to A zone).



30 September 1899. Private postcard from Venice to France, prepaid 10 centesimi (unified zone).



France joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



17 August 1880. Double rate letter from Genoa to Paris (France), prepaid 50 centesimi (to A zone).



26 January 1885. Registered single rate letter from Turin to Grenoble (France), prepaid 50 centesimi. Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single letter rate (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.






<u>22 April 1895.</u> Lettercard by 20 centesimi from Turin to Quesnoy-sur-Deûle (France), through integration with postage stamps of 10 and 20 centesimi (to A zone).



23 July 1882. Registered double rate letter from Castelfiorentino to Allier (France), prepaid 75 centesimi. Rate 75 centesimi : 50 centesimi double letter rate (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





23 July 1897. Registered worthless specimen from Naples to Paris (France), prepaid 50 centesimi. Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi worthless specimen of 250 grams (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



<u>5 October 1897.</u> Registered nine rate letter from Spezia to Paris (France), prepaid 2,50 Lire. Rate 2,50 Lire: 2,25 Lire nine letter rate (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



Switzerland joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.




18 August 1885. Single rate printed matters from Trani to Zurich (Switzerland), prepaid 5 centesimi (to A zone).



21 April 1879. Single rate letter from Incisa Belbo (now Incisa Scapaccino – Asti) to Lugano (Switzerland), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).





<u>22 May 1899.</u> Registered private postcard from Treviso to Bern (Switzerland), prepaid 35 centesimi. Rate 35 centesimi : 10 centesimi postcard (unified zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



27 July 1889. Registered triple rate letter from Rome to Lausanne (Switzerland). Rate 1 Lira: 75 centesimi triple rate letter (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee, prepaid with 1 Lira perforated BN (National Bank in the Kingdom of Italy).





27 February 1882. Single rate letter from Antrodoco to Gallery St. Gottardo (Switzerland), underprepaid 20 centesimi and charged 10 centesimi on delivery.



16 February 1899. Registered double rate letter from Bari to Lausanne (Switzerland), prepaid 75 centesimi. Rate 75 centesimi : 50 centesimi double rate letter (unified zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





3 November 1897. Insured double rate letter from Rome to Bern (Switzerland), prepaid 85 centesimi (to A zone), handstamped by Agenzia Postale Privata in Rome.

Rate 85 centesimi: 50 centesimi double rate letter, 25 centesimi registration fee and 10 centesimi insured fee.



<u>8 February 1898.</u> Insured double rate letter from Sanremo to Appenzell (Switzerland), prepaid 95 cent. (to A zone). Rate 95 centesimi : 50 centesimi double rate letter, 25 centesimi registration fee and 20 centesimi insured fee.



Austro Hungarian Empire joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



22 September 1892. Single rate printed matter from Monsummano to Pola (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 5 centesimi (to A zone).



11 September 1882. Triple rate printed matters from Florence to Pieve Tesino (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 15 centesimi (to A zone).





24 August 1886. Visiting card from Milan to Wien (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 5 centesimi as printed matters (to A zone).



19 June 1899. Triple rate registered letter from Milan to Budapest (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 1 Lira. Rate 1 Lira: 75 centesimi triple letter rate (unified zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





22 September 1893. Single rate letter from Venice to Bisenz (Bzenec - Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



3 March 1897. Double rate registered letter from Rome to Prague (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 75 centesimi. Rate 75 centesimi : 50 centesimi double letter rate (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





81 May 1895. Insured double rate letter from Reggio Emilia to Wien (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 25 centesimi Rate 85 centesimi : 50 centesimi double letter rate (to A zone), 25 centesimi registration fee and 10 cent. insured fee.



<u>1 February 1901.</u> Insured triple rate letter from Udine to Budapest (Austro Hungarian Empire), prepaid 1,10 Lire. Rate 1,10 Lire : 75 centesimi triple letter rate (unified zone), 25 centesimi registration fee and 10 centesimi insured fee



In the Italian Kingdom the Express Delivery Service was established on 21 July 1890 in some countries only, like Argentina (partially), Austrian Empire, Belgium, Chile, Denmark (partially), German Empire, Japan, Luxembourg, Montenegro, Holland, Paraguay (partially), Salvador (partially), Serbia, Siam and Switzerland.



31 July 1895. Double rate express letter from Este, near Padua, to Roncegno (Austro Hungarian Empire). Rate 80 centesimi : 50 centesimi double letter rate (to A zone) and 30 centesimi express delivery fee.



The handstamp "cambio con l'estero" had set up on 1 July 1889, to number registered and insured mail from abroad with the name of Post Office, date and daily progressive number. These handstamps were used normally on letters from abroad and its use on letters franked by Italian stamps is very unusual. This less effective system was the cause of many time lags at the Mail Transit Offices and was abolished less than two years later, on 1 May 1891.



9 March 1890. Registerd letter from Naples to Vienna (Austria).

Due to the unknown addressee this letter was returned to the sender and stamped on the TPO Pontebba - Bologna II as registered letter from abroad.



Norway joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



February 1892. Single rate printed matter from Florence to Christiania (Norway), prepaid 5 centesimi (to A zone).



17 April 1890. Lettercard by 20 centesimi from Catania to Christiania (Norway), through integration with postage stamps of 5 centesimi (to A zone).



Denmark joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



15 April 1898. Single rate printed matter from Pisa to Copenaghen (Denmark), prepaid 5 centesimi (to A zone).



15 April 1896. Single rate letter from Florence to Copenaghen (Denmark), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



Sweden joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



24 August 1882. Single rate letter from Florence to Västerås (Sweden), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



31 May 1883. Registered doubled rate letter from Pescara to Lund (Sweden), prepaid 75 centesimi (to A zone). Rate 75 centesimi : 50 centesimi double rate letter and 25 centesimi registration fee.





20 April 1894. Registered lettercard by 20 centesimi through integration with postage stamps of 5 and 25 centesimi.

From Naples to Nordmaling (Sweden) where the letter arrived on 26 April and then it was re-addressed to Sundsvall.

Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi lettercard (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



29 January 1895. Registered triple rate letter from Modena to Lund (Sweden). Rate 1 Lira: 75 centesimi triple rate letter (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



From 1809 Finland was an autonomous Grand Duchy belonging to the Russian Empire and therefore was subject to the Conventions and the rates stipulated between the Kingdom of Italy and Russian Empire. Russia and then Finland, joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1^{st} April 1879.



16 April 1884. Single rate letter from Palermo to Helsinki (Finland - Russian Empire), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



30 December 1899. Registered single rate letter from Florence to Helsinki (Finland - Russian Empire). Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single letter rate (unified zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



Russian Empire joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



24 August 1882. Double rate letter from Florence to St. Petersburg (Russian Empire), prepaid 50 centesimi (to A zone).



3 September 1901. Single rate letter from Saltino to St Petersburg (Russian Empire), prepaid 25 centesimi (unified zone).



United Kingdom joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



<u>21 March 1898.</u> Single rate Worthless specimen from Leghorn to London (England – United Kingdom), containing asbestos, prepaid 10 centesimi (to A zone).



24 August 1896. Single rate letter to London (England – United Kingdom), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).





30 September 1902. Lettercard by 5 centesimi through integration with postage stamps of 20 centesimi from Genoa to London (England – United Kingdom).



20 August 1884. Registered single rate letter from S. Pier d'Arena to London (England – United Kingdom). Rate 50 centesimi : 20 centesimi single rate letter (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





14 August 1895. Single rate letter from Pietra Ligure to Cardiff (Wales-United Kingdom), prepaid 25 cent.(to A zone).



10 August 1899. Registered double rate letter from Pietra Ligure to Newport (Wales – United Kingdom). Rate 75 centesimi : 50 centesimi double rate letter (unified zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





23 December 1887. Visiting card from Cava dei Tirreni to Dublin (Ireland – United Kingdom), prepaid 5 cent.(to A zone). Until 31st August 1905 Visiting card was franked as Printed matters, as long as in an open envelope and carried without additional written.




14 April 1880. Single rate letter from Florence to Leighlinbribge (Ireland – United Kingdom), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).





<u>5 October 1886.</u> Single rate letter from Cadenabbia to Elie (England – United Kingdom), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone) and then redirected to Edinburgh (Scotland – United Kingdom).



8 June 1902. Single rate letter from Genoa to Glasgow (Scotland – United Kingdom), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



German Empire joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



<u>9 June 1898.</u> Postcard by 5 centesimi from Syracuse to Leipzig (German Empire), through integration with postage stamps of 5 centesimi (to A zone).



<u>7 March 1899.</u> Picture postcard from Milan to Hof in Bayern (German Empire), prepaid 10 centesimi (unified zone).





17 May 1895. Lettercard by 20 centesimi from Naples to Ravensburg (German Empire), through integration with postage stamps of 5 centesimi (to A zone).



<u>27 April 1886.</u> Double rate letter from Spezia to Magdeburg (German Empire), prepaid 50 centesimi (to A zone).





<u>2 April 1895.</u> Registered single rate letter from Capri to München (German Empire). Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single rate letter (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



19 December 1898. Registered Worthless specimen from Catania to München (German Empire). Rate 35 centesimi: 10 centesimi for specimen till to 100 grams (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.





8 May 1888. Registered eight times rate letter from Rome to Aachen (German Empire), prepaid 2,30 Lire (to A zone) with a postage stamp of 30 centesimi and a postage stamps of 2 Lire.

Recorded only this letter with combined use of these two postage stamps.

Rate 2,30 Lire: 2 Lire eight times rate letter (25 centesimi for each 15 grams of weight) and 25 centesimi registration fee (overpaid 5 centesimi), probably caused by confusion with the domestic rate (30 centesimi) compared with foreign rate (25 centesimi).

German Empire

1st Chapter: Mail to the European Countries 1.2 - Countries mainly reached overland



The Cash on Delivery service was established in 1890 for inland and in 1892 for abroad. For inland, the fee was compulsory all prepaid by stamps on the postal object, for abroad this fee was paid deducting the amount by the sum of money paid by addressee, before repayment it to the sender. The postal objects were prepaid for the postal rate, registration fee (eventually insurance) and no more. The "Remboursement" label was compulsory.




20 March 1895. Double rate 5 Liras "Remboursement" letter from Florence to Schmalhof (German Empire). Rate 75 centesimi : 50 centesimi double rate letter (to A zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee (COD service 30 c.).

Very rare the Cash on Delivery Service of letters for abroad during XIX Century



In the Kingdom of Italy the Express Delivery Service was established on 21 July 1890. The special fee was 25 centesimi for inland and 30 centesimi for abroad. These mails were treated specially and delivered like telegrams, from sunrise till to over the sunset. Sometime the sender writing "delivery by day" or like in this cover: "Durch Eilboten zu bestellen. Nicht bei Nacht": Express Delivery. Not by Night.



11 March 1902. Five times rate express letter to Altenburg (German Empire), mailed to the rail station and cancelled by the Pisa-Torino TPO.

Rate 1.55 Lire: 1,25 Lire five times rate letter (unified zone) and 30 centesimi express delivery fee.





12 January 1898. Double rate express letter from Ancona to Mainz (German Empire). Rate 80 centesimi : 50 centesimi double rate letter (to A zone) and 30 centesimi express delivery fee.



The Netherlands joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1^{st} April 1879.



23 October 1898. Picture Postcard from Lake Como to Grafenhaage (The Netherlands), prepaid 10 centesimi (to A zone).



28 March 1896. Single rate letter from Genoa to Amsterdam (The Netherlands), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).





23 June 1900. Lettercard by 5 centesimi from Genoa to Amsterdam (The Netherlands), through integration with two postage stamps of 10 centesimi (unified zone).



31 October 1899. Registered single rate letter to Haarlem (The Netherlands), prepaid 50 centesimi (unified zone).

Rate 50 centesimi: 25 centesimi single rate letter and 25 centesimi registration fee.



Belgium joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



31 August 1897. Single rate letter to Bruxelles (Belgium), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



<u>15 March 1901.</u> Registered picture postcard from Barlassina to Liege (Belgium), prepaid 35 centesimi (unified zone). Rate 35 centesimi : 10 centesimi postcard rate and 25 centesimi registration fee.





<u>3 November 1896.</u> Registered single rate letter from Rome to Gant (Belgium), prepaid 50 centesimi (to A zone). Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single rate letter and 25 centesimi registration fee.



13 September 1895. Insured double rate letter from Sanremo to Ostende (Belgium), prepaid 1,50 Lire (to A zone). Rate 1,50 Lire: 50 centesimi double rate letter, 25 centesimi registration fee and 75 centesimi insured fee.



Luxembourg joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



9 August 1899. Picture postcard from Milan to Luxembourg, prepaid 10 centesimi (unified zone).



10 April 1901. Single rate letter from Naples to Luxembourg, prepaid 25 centesimi (unified zone).



Bulgaria joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st July 1879.



29 July 1897. Postcard from Naples to Tran (Bulgaria), prepaid 10 centesimi (to A zone).



21 August 1888. Single rate letter from Ferrara to Rusteink (Bulgaria), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



Romania up to 1878, when became fully independent, was formally part of the Ottoman Empire. Romania joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.




6 November 1892. Private postcard from Padua to Bucharest (Romania), prepaid 10 centesimi (to A zone).



31 December 1879. Registered single rate letter from Modena to Transylvania (Romania), prepaid 25 c. (to A zone). Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single rate letter and 25 centesimi registration fee.



Poland up to 1919, when became fully independent, was formally part of the Austro Hungarian Empire, Russian Empire and German Empire.



<u>21 January 1899.</u> Picture postcard from Milan to Gdansk (Poland), prepaid 5 centesimi (unified zone) as printed matters.



2a April 1898. Single rate letter from Milan to Lodz (Poland), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).



Spain joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



4 December 1882. Single rate letter from Milan to London (United Kigdom), prepaid 25 centesimi (to A zone).

The letter was on 7 December successfully re-addressed to Valencia (Spain).



14 January 1898. Registered single rate letter from Rome to Barcelona (Spain), prepaid 50 centesimi (to A zone).

Rate 50 centesimi : 25 centesimi single rate letter and 25 centesimi registration fee.



Portugal joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879.



<u>24 July 1900.</u> Picture postcard from Turin to Lisbon (Portugal), prepaid 5 centesimi (unified zone), as printed matters.





Uruguay joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st July 1880.



6 March 1880. Registered letter from Desenzano sul Lago to Florida (Uruguay), prepaid 65 centesimi, (to C zone). The C zone rate was in effect on 1st July 1892 and the "non UPU Countries" rate was made equal the B zone rate.

The letter was refused by the addressee (Rechazada por el recipient) and rejected (Devuelta) to Desenzano sul Lago, after the transit from the Central Bureau of Refuse in Rome.

Rate 65 centesimi: 40 centesimi single rate letter (to C zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



<u>2 September 1889.</u> Postcard by 10 centesimi from Florence to Montevideo (Uruguay), through integration with postage stamps of 5 centesimi (to B zone).

The letter was wrongly carried to Colon (Panama) where it arrived on 30 January 1900 and then readdressed to Uruguay (after Rio de Janeiro transit) where it arrived on 5 April 1900.

17 July 1891. Registered single rate letter from Gropello Cairoli to Buenos Aires, prepaid 65 centesimi (to B zone). Rate 65 centesimi : 40 centesimi single rate letter (to B zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee.



23 May 1888. Acknowledgment of receipt from Pellio di Sopra to Buenos Aires (Argentina), prepaid 25 centesimi.

Peru joined in the Universal Postal Union since 1st April 1879, while Bolivia since 1st April 1886.



3 December 1887. Single rate letter from S. Margherita Ligure to Tacna (Peru), prepaid 40 centesimi (to B zone).



20 September 1890. Registered single rate letter from Rome to Santa Cruz (Bolivia), prepaid 65 centesimi. Rate 65 centesimi: 40 centesimi single rate letter (to B zone) and 25 centesimi registration fee. The addressee was dead (handwritten on reverse Décèdé – Fallecido) and on 13 December the letter was carried to the sender. Upon arrival in Italy (Genoa) on 22 February the handstamp "cambio con l'estero" was struck. These handstamps were used from 1st July 1889 normally on letters from abroad and its use on letters franked by Italian stamps is very unusual. This less effective system was the cause of many time lags at the Mail Transit Offices and was abolished less than two years later, on 1 May 1891.

10 April 1892. Double rate letter from Rome to Santiago (Chile), underpaid 40 centesimi as single rate letter to B zone, but the rate required was 80 centesimi. The letter was fined on delivery 16 centavos as confirmed by the handstamp "SANTIAGO 16 Cs MULTADA" struck in Santiago.
